### SB 345 DO PASS

HB 881 (Jones, 46<sup>th</sup>): Relating to elementary and secondary education, so as to provide for legislative findings and intent; to establish the Georgia Charter Schools Commission.

The bill allows petitioners who want to start a new charter school an additional route to seek approval aside from local boards of education, some of whom have a history of denying well-qualified applications.

Chairman Weber, 40th, announced to the Committee that this will be a hearing only and two more hearings would be conducted on HB 881 before a vote would be taken.

Representative Jones, 46<sup>th</sup>, author of the bill and Andrew Broy, Associate Superintendent, Policy and Charter Schools, Office of Policy and External Affairs for the Georgia Department of Education, spoke to the bill.

Jones also announced to the Committee that this bill has the support of Governor Sonny Perdue and Kathy Cox, Georgia Schools Superintendent.

Speaking in support of the bill were Faith Shiffert, parent of charter school children (but has some concerns) and Linda Zechmann, member of the State Board of Charter Schools and member of First Congressional District, Georgia Board of Education.

Speaking in opposition to the bill were Angela Palm, GSBA, and Jim Mullins, DeKalb County Schools.

There was much discussion on the bill.

# SB 497 (Williams, 19<sup>th</sup>): Education; local school systems; reassign high school foreign language teachers

Senator Williams, 19<sup>th</sup>, spoke to his bill. The bill adds a new Code Section that requires local school systems that receive Quality Based Education (QBE) funding for high school foreign language teachers to reassign all foreign language high school teachers to an elementary school to teach foreign language beginning in the 2010-2011 school year. Furthermore, any newly hired foreign language teachers, no later than 2010-2011 school year, whose salary includes any QBE funds, will be assigned to teach a foreign language in an elementary school. Local school systems are also encouraged to make high school foreign language courses accessible to its students through the Georgia Virtual School. He does not feel this should be done in high school.

Discussion from Moody, 53<sup>rd</sup>, Thomas, 2<sup>nd</sup>, and Weber, 40<sup>th</sup> led.

Senator Williams, 19<sup>th</sup>, decided to hold the bill for now.

#### SB 497 HELD OVER

# SB 506 (Carter, 13<sup>th</sup>): "SHAPE Act"; require local school systems to conduct physical testing of students

Carter, 13<sup>th</sup>, spoke to his bill and noted there was a study committee conducted during the summer on this subject. He continues to go over the PowerPoint on obesity.

Thomas, 2<sup>nd</sup>, opposed the bill as written.

Speaking in support of the bill: William Sexton, Georgia Chapter American Pediatrics; Dr. Bill Burns, American Heart Association; John Bare, Atlanta Falcons Youth foundation; Jeff Hubbard, GAE.

Thomas, 2<sup>nd</sup>, offered an amendment – amendment failed 4-7. Weber, 40<sup>th</sup>, offered a friendly amendment – motion made by Douglas, 17<sup>th</sup>, seconded by Thomas, 54<sup>th</sup>, to do pass by committee substitute and it passed 9-0.

Douglas, 17<sup>th</sup>, was recognized to speak to the bill for the author. With no discussion on the bill, Jackson, 24<sup>th</sup>, moved and Ramsey, 43<sup>rd</sup>, seconded to Do Pass. Vote was unanimous.

# HB 1031 (Rep. Hembree, 67<sup>th</sup>): Public high schools; athletics program; at least one defibrillator; require

This legislation recognizes recent instances of cardiac arrests in high school students that participate in high school sports, the need for a quick response to an emergency is critical in saving lives and requires that each public high school that has an interscholastic athletics program in Georgia, have at least one functional automatic external defibrillator on site at all times.

Hembree, 67<sup>th</sup>, presented his bill. Discussion followed with Thomas, 54<sup>th</sup>, demonstrating how to use the defibrillator.

Thomas, 54<sup>th</sup>, moved and Douglas, 17<sup>th</sup>, seconded the motion to Do Pass. Vote was unanimous.

### **HB 1031 DO PASS**

# HB 250 (Rep. Maxwell, 17<sup>th</sup>): Local boards of education; reports of criminal offenses; revise provisions

The bill amends the current law to allow an investigation of educators by the Professional Standards Commission for complaints alleging that an educator has been convicted of any criminal offense involving the manufacturing, distribution, trafficking, selling, or possession of a controlled substance or marijuana or of any sexual offense as referenced by law in Section 1.

Maxwell, 17<sup>th</sup>, spoke to his bill. Kelly Henson, Director of PFC explained the amendment to the bill. Much discussion was led by Carter, 13<sup>th</sup>, Balfour, 9<sup>th</sup>, Weber, 40<sup>th</sup>, and Gary Walker, Professional Standards Commission.

Carter, 13<sup>th</sup>, moved to do pass as amended and was seconded by Moody, 56<sup>th</sup>. The vote was unanimous.

### **HB 250 DO PASS BY SUBSTITUTE**

# HB 962 (Rep. Freeman, 140<sup>th</sup>): Local boards of education; budget deficit; require public notice

This bill requires the superintendent and local school board chairperson to publish in the official county organ and the largest circulated newspaper in the county or municipality, notice of any financial irregularities or budget deficits within the accounting system of the local school system or a school within the system, once a week for two consecutive weeks. Additionally the bill requires that the local board of education publish, once a week for two weeks, a statement of actual financial operations of the system, or schools within the system, in the official county organ and a newspaper that has the largest general circulation in the county or municipality of the school board.

Freeman, 140<sup>th</sup>, spoke to his bill. Weber, 40<sup>th</sup>, Moody, 56<sup>th</sup>, and Douglas, 17<sup>th</sup>, followed up with much discussion and questions. Moody, 56<sup>th</sup>, offered an amendment. Amendment passed unanimously. Second amendment offered by Weber, 40<sup>th</sup>, and Douglas, 17<sup>th</sup>, opposed the amendment. This amendment carried 7-1. The third amendment was offered by Moody, 56<sup>th</sup>. Fort, 39<sup>th</sup>, seconded the motion, and it passed unanimously. Freeman, 140<sup>th</sup>, agreed to the amendments.

With more discussion it was decided to work on the language for the substitute.

### **HB 962 HELD OVER**

# HB 652 (Rep. Manning, 32<sup>nd</sup>): Blind Persons' Braille Literacy Rights and Education Act; enact

The bill amends current law by adding a new Code Section establishing the "Blind Persons' Braille Literacy Rights and Education Act." (Act) The purpose of the Act is to provide Braille instruction in the individualized education program (IEP) to a student who is blind or visually impaired.

Mullis,  $53^{rd}$ , was recognized to speak to Representative Manning's bill. Representative Reece,  $11^{th}$ , also spoke to the bill.

Much discussion followed.

Betty Grenevitch, Georgia Council for the Blind, and Vince Martin, who works as a Research Scientist at Veterans Administration Hospital, were recognized to speak in favor of the bill.

A motion was made by Thomas, 54<sup>th</sup>, and Thomas, 2<sup>nd</sup>, seconded the motion to Do Pass. Vote was unanimous.

# HB 652 DO PASS

# HB 637 (Coleman, 97<sup>th</sup>): Quality Basic Education Act; nationally norm-referenced instruments; revise provisions

Relating to the assessment of effectiveness of educational programs under the "Quality Basic Education Act," so as to revise provisions relating to nationally norm-referenced instruments in reading, mathematics, science, and social studies.

Rep. Benton, 31<sup>st</sup>, was recognized to speak to the bill for Coleman, 97<sup>th</sup>, the author of the bill. He stated that the bill was requested by the Department of Education.

Much discussion followed.

Courtney Burnett with DOE asked for clarification from Benton and he responded. With no further questions, Carter, 13<sup>th</sup>, made a motion and was seconded by Douglas, 17<sup>th</sup>, to Do Pass. The vote was unanimous. HB 637 will be carried by Hudgens, 47<sup>th</sup>, in the Senate.

# HB 1181 (Benton, 31<sup>st</sup>): State Board of Education; donations, grants & federal aid acceptance; provisions

Relating to elementary and secondary education, so as to revise provisions relating to acceptance of donations, grants, and federal aid for vocational or other educational purposes by the State Board of Education; to provide that the State School Superintendent is authorized to enter into contracts for \$100,000.00 or less.

Rep. Benton,  $31^{st}$ , spoke to his bill and with no questions. Senator Douglas,  $17^{th}$ , made a motion to Do Pass and was seconded by Thomas,  $54^{th}$ . Vote was unanimous. HB 1181 will be carried by Hudgens,  $47^{th}$ , in the Senate.

Chairman Weber, 40<sup>th</sup>, recognized Rep. Coleman, 97<sup>th</sup>, to speak to his bill. This bill is sponsored by me and the Chairman of the Senate Education Committee, Senator Dan Weber, 40<sup>th</sup>. He continued to explain the purpose of the bill and why it was drafted.

At this time Thomas, 2<sup>nd</sup>, was recognized and moved to Do Pass and was seconded by Thomas, 54<sup>th</sup>. Vote was unanimous.

# HB 641 (Coleman, 97<sup>th</sup>): Education, Department of; State Board; Ga. Excellence Foundation; establish

Relating to elementary and secondary education; so as to revise a provision relating to the delegation of authority to employ staff at the Department of Education; to provide that the State Board of Education can solicit donations, grants, gifts, devises, and bequests; to establish the Georgia Educational Excellence Foundation.

Chairman Weber, 40<sup>th</sup>, recognized Rep. Tommy Benton, 31<sup>st</sup>, to speak to Rep. Coleman's, bill. Rep. Benton, 31<sup>st</sup>, presented a committee substitute to the bill. The bill is a companion bill to HB 1181 passed out of this committee. This was brought about by a request from the Department of Education. He went through the changes made to the bill. The Governor's Office called for the language to this bill. He continued to explain the changes. With no further questions, ready for motion.

Jennifer Hackemeyer with Georgia DOE General Counsel, and Bennett, with DOE spoke briefly in favor of the bill.

Fort, 39<sup>th</sup>, arrived to vote on this bill.

Motion made by Thomas, 54<sup>th</sup>, and Jackson, 24<sup>th</sup>, seconded the motion to Do Pass By Substitute. Vote was unanimous.

### HB 641 DO PASS BY SUBSTITUTE

# HB 1321 (Shaw, 176<sup>th</sup>): Education; alleged inappropriate behavior by teacher or school personnel; provisions

The bill amends current law to include a new provision in K-12 student codes of conduct to address students who make false statements, omit or make erroneous claims regarding alleged inappropriate behavior by a teacher, administrator, or other school employee. Furthermore, this bill adds a new Code Section which directs the Professional Standards Commission to establish a process for students to follow in reporting inappropriate behavior.

Chairman Weber, 40<sup>th</sup>, recognized Rep. Shaw, 176<sup>th</sup>, to speak to his bill. He went over some changes he had made to the bill.

Kelley Henson spoke in support of the bill but wanted to make sure it protects students who have real sexual misconduct.

More discussion and changes to the language of the bill followed and Betsy Howerton, Legislative Counsel, was recognized for clarification on language.

Thomas, 2<sup>nd</sup>, and Kelly Henson agreed to the substitute language. The author of the bill, Shaw, 176<sup>th</sup>, does not agree to some of the changes in the bill. More discussion led.

At this point, Chairman Weber,  $40^{\text{th}}$ , announced that no vote would be taken on this bill today.

# HB 1209 (Coleman, 97<sup>th</sup>): State Board of Education; local school systems; contracts; provisions

Relating to elementary and secondary education, so as to provide that a local school system may enter into a contract with the State Board of Education for increased flexibility in exchange for increased accountability; to provide that a local system can opt for the status quo; to provide for the development of a three-year strategic plan.

Coleman, 97<sup>th</sup>, was recognized to speak to his bill. Johnson, 1<sup>st</sup>, arrived at this time. Coleman, 97<sup>th</sup>, went over a hand-out which he presented to the committee. Chairman Weber, 40<sup>th</sup>, asked that Coleman, 97<sup>th</sup>, explain to the committee what OSA is. Jennifer Ritner was recognized to speak also.

Thomas, 2<sup>nd</sup>, Weber, 40<sup>th</sup>, Jackson, 24<sup>th</sup>, and Rep. Coleman, 9<sup>7th</sup>, continued discussion on the bill. Dean Alford was asked to explain portions of the bill. Fort, 39<sup>th</sup>, was recognized for questions.

Johnson, 1<sup>st</sup>, was recognized to discuss his substitute and Jennifer Ritner accompanied him to explain parts of the substitute. Johnson, 1<sup>st</sup>, had 2 offers to amend, and Douglas, 17<sup>th</sup>, agreed to the amendments. Marcus Downs with GAE was recognized to speak and commended the efforts for the bill but feels it needs change; concerns with student achievement, opposed as is now. Margaret Cicarelli with PAGE thanked Coleman, 97<sup>th</sup>, for the bill, but had concerns about Title 20 Waivers – with those changes they could support the bill. Three amendments were offered. Weber, 40<sup>th</sup> offered the amendment and there was a motion from Thomas, 54th, and Douglas, 17<sup>th</sup>, seconded the motion – the amendment was a Do Pass. A second amendment was offered by Douglas, 17<sup>th</sup>, and he moved on the amendment, and Thomas, 54<sup>th</sup>, seconded - with Fort, 39<sup>th</sup>, voting against this amendment. Carter, 13<sup>th</sup>, spoke about language. Weber, 40<sup>th</sup>, moved and was seconded by Douglas, 17<sup>th</sup>. Fort voted against the amendment. A vote was cast on the third amendment, Thomas, 54<sup>th</sup> moved and Douglas, 17<sup>th</sup>, seconded to Do Pass by Substitute. The majority vote carried 4-1, with Fort, 39<sup>th</sup>, opposing.

# HB 905 (Millar, 79<sup>th</sup>): Building Resourceful Individuals to Develop Georgia's Economy Act; enact

Relating to "Quality Basic Education Act," so as to enact the "Building Resourceful Individuals to Develop Georgia's Economy Act" so as to implement programs to improve graduation rates and to improve the preparedness of students for postsecondary education and careers; to provide for involvement of parents and guardians.

Millar, 79<sup>th</sup>, was recognized to speak to his bill. He then referred to the Substitute to the bill from the Governor's Office. Discussion followed.

Jackson, 24<sup>th</sup>, was recognized to speak and said this was the best legislation he has ever seen and he felt like it would work. Fort, 39<sup>th</sup>, liked the bill, but had a question about graduates; Millar, 79<sup>th</sup>, satisfied his question. Relating to discipline of students in elementary and secondary education, so as to provide that falsifying reports regarding instances of alleged inappropriate behavior by a teacher or other school personnel is addressed in the student code of conduct; to establish a state mandated process for students to follow in reporting instances of alleged inappropriate behavior by a teacher or other school personnel; to provide for notice of such process in student and teacher handbooks.

Chairman Weber, 40<sup>th</sup>, recognized Shaw, 176<sup>th</sup>, to speak to his bill. He explained that he had a committee substitute to his bill and went over the changes. With no further discussion on the bill, Williams, 19<sup>th</sup>, moved and Thomas, 54<sup>th</sup>, seconded to Do Pass by Substitute. Vote was unanimous. # HB 602 (Rep. Cole, 125<sup>th</sup>): School board members; selling school supplies; penalty; provide exception

Relating to the prohibition of a school board member from selling school supplies or equipment to county board and a penalty, so as to provide an exception to such prohibition.

Chairman Weber, 40<sup>th</sup>, recognized Cole, 125<sup>th</sup>, to speak to his bill. A representative from the School Board Association spoke briefly in favor of the bill. With no questions, Thomas, 54<sup>th</sup>, moved and Carter, 13<sup>th</sup> seconded to Do Pass. Vote was unanimous. Tolleson, 20<sup>th</sup>, will carry the bill in the Senate.

# HB 602 DO PASS

# HB 1300 (Carter, 175<sup>th</sup>): Minimum school year; certain school days; provisions

Relating to the minimum school year and other matters, so as to provide that certain school days which were cancelled due to disaster, emergency, act of God, and other occurrences do not have to be made up under certain circumstances.

Weber, 40<sup>th</sup>, recognized Carter, 17<sup>th</sup>, to speak to her bill and no questions or discussion followed. Weber, 40<sup>th</sup>, moved to Do Pass and was seconded by Carter, 13<sup>th</sup>. Vote was unanimous. Senator Thomas, 54<sup>th</sup>, will carry the bill in the Senate.

#### HB 1300 DO PASS

HB 1169 (Morgan, 39<sup>th</sup>): Relating to definitions relative to early care and learning programs, so as to revise the definition of "day-care center" so as to exclude certain private schools which provide kindergarten through grade 12 education from regulation as day-care centers.

Weber, 40<sup>th</sup>, recognized Morgan, 39<sup>th</sup>, to speak to her bill. Williams, 19<sup>th</sup>, and Weber, 40<sup>th</sup>, related questions to the author of the bill. Morgan, 39<sup>th</sup>, responded to their questions. Betsy Howerton, Legislative Counsel, was called on to give legal clarification. Ellen Williams, Ga. Child Care Association opposed the bill. Alicia Morgan was recognized to speak about differences on the bill. Thomas, 2<sup>nd</sup>, was recognized and discussion continued. Williams, 19<sup>th</sup>, moved to Do Pass by substitute and Thomas, 54<sup>th</sup>, seconded the motion to Do Pass with Tate, 38<sup>th</sup> opposing. The vote was unanimous. Wiles, 37<sup>th</sup>, will carry in the Senate.

# HB 904 (Jerguson, 22<sup>nd</sup>): Early care and learning; fingerprint record checks; require certain employees

Relating to early care and learning, so as to require certain employees to have state and national fingerprint record checks prior to employment; to review certain definitions; to change certain provisions relating to records check requirements for applicants and notification to such applicants.

Chairman Weber, 40<sup>th</sup>, recognized Jerguson, 22<sup>nd</sup> to speak to his bill and introduced an amendment to his bill. With Tate, 38<sup>th</sup>, not satisfied with the bill or the changes, Jerguson, 22<sup>nd</sup>, continued to explain the bill in detail to her. Discussion continued.

Those expressing concerns with the bill regarding the 10 days were: Tate, 38<sup>th</sup>, Lisa Padgett with Child Care Network, Melva Henderson, Trainer for State of Georgia to train employees, and Helen Harden, Director in Clayton County Child Care.

Ella Williams with Child Care Organization is very supportive of the change "10<sup>th</sup> day admission." An agreement was made on the substitute.

Weber, 40<sup>th</sup>, spoke to the committee and said he would like a vote and if it does not work, then come back and work on it.

Thomas, 54<sup>th</sup> moved to Do Pass by Substitute HB 904 and was seconded by Jackson, 24<sup>th</sup>. Opposed was Tate, 38<sup>th</sup>. With majority vote met, HB 904 Do Pass by Substitute. Chip Rogers, 21<sup>st</sup>, will carry HB 904 in the Senate.
