2009-2010

- 1. Quorum of the Committee shall be six (6).
- 2. The Chairman shall determine which bills and resolutions are to be considered and the order in which said measures are considered.
- 3. The Chairman shall have the authority to refer bills and resolutions to subcommittees for study. Such subcommittees in turn shall have the authority to make recommendations on such measures to the full Committee.
- 4. The Committee shall convene, recess, and adjourn upon the order of the Chairman.
- 5. Any member or members of the Committee who disagrees with the Majority Report of the Committee shall be privileged to fill a Minority Report if they so desire.
- 6. These rules may be amended upon a motion duly made and subsequently approved by two-thirds of the members of the Committee.
- 7. A bill, resolution, or other matter will be considered only after presentation by its principal author or a legislator whom he has designated to do so. In the event more than one member of the General Assembly has signed a measure, the principal author shall be the one whose name appears first in the list of authors.
- 8. Where these rules are silent on a specific issue, the Rules of the Senate, as Adopted, shall govern.

He did not agree with the allotment of funds. Balfour, 9th, was recognized and opposed Garrett's suggestion. Questions were asked from Williams, 19th, Johnson, 1st, Fort, 39th, and Weber, 40th. There was clarification from Andrew Broy on Fort's, 39th, questions. Johnson moved Do Pass by Substitute. Weber, 40th, had amendments and asked for clarification on the amendments from Legislative Council, Betsy Howerton. The language of the bill needs a deadline on transfers included in the amendments.

Chairman Weber, 40th, amendments:

On amendment #1- Johnson, 1st, moved and Thomas, 54th, seconded Do Pass. Voting for passage was Johnson, 1st, Thomas, 54th, Williams, 19th, Butterworth, 50th, Fort, 39th, Balfour, 9th, and Weber, 40th. Amendment #1 Do Pass unanimously.

On amendment #2- Thomas, 54th, moved and Johnson, 1st, seconded Do Pass. Voting for passage was Weber, 40th, Johnson, 1st, Thomas, 54th, Williams, 19th, Butterworth, 50th, Fort, 39th, and Balfour, 9th. Amendment #2 Do Pass unanimously.

On amendment #3- Johnson, 1st, moved and Thomas, 54th, seconded Do Pass. Voting for passage was Weber, 40th, Johnson, 1st, Thomas, 54th, Williams, 19th, Butterworth, 50th, Fort, 39th, and Balfour, 9th. Amendment #3 Do Pass unanimously.

Johnson, 1st, made a motion on the bill and Weber, 40th seconded Do Pass by Substitute. Fort, 39th, opposed. Vote carried (6-1) HB-251 Do Pass by Substitute.

Weber, 40th, will carry this bill in the Senate.

Chairman Weber, 40th, announced to the committee that HB-493 would be moved to the next scheduled meeting.

Chairman Weber, 40th, called the meeting to order at 9:48 a.m.

The following bill was considered:

HB 493 (Representative Brooks, 63rd): The bill amends current law to allow the Georgia Youth Conservation Corps the ability to assist in home weatherization projects that seek to reduce energy consumption for home heating and cooling. The bill authorizes the commissioner of the corps to contract with a charitable organization for management and supervision of any projects relating to the reduction of energy consumption for home heating and cooling. Pursuant to this bill, projects can only occur on private residential property and only federal funds made available to the state can be used for these projects.

Chairman Weber, 40^{th} , announced to the committee that he had invited Phil Foil with GEFA and Commissioner Michael Thurmond with the Georgia Department of Labor to testify before the committee.

Chairman Weber, 40th, assigned a study committee on HB-493 consisting of Ramsey, 43rd, as Chairman, Tate, 38th, and Butterworth, 50th, to examine and study the bill closer. An amendment was presented (LC 25 1152ER) by the study committee. Weber, 40th, explained that he would like to stream line this and avoid more bureaucracy.

Phil Foil with GEFA spoke. They contract with 21 different organizations to audit homes after verification of funds and if approved, help weatherize homes. Under the organizations they have 19 community action agencies, two local government agencies, and one nonprofit. Funding works with low-income families. All the funds will be used for weatherization. Money flows to Community Action Agencies.

Balfour, 9th had asked for clarification of Conservation Corps. Author of the bill, Representative Brooks, 63rd, responded to his questions. Weber, 40th, directed questions to Phil Foil, who responded.

Michael Thurmond, Commissioner of the Department of Labor, was recognized to speak. He stated that he was very familiar with these programs.

Chairman Weber, 40th, proposed the following amendment: line 3 – delete from "to provide" to "selected".

Ramsey, 43rd, said the deadline had passed to receive the funds. The question was whether they would be eligible for those funds if HB-493 passed. He directed the questions to Commissioner Thurmond, who responded. Weber, 40th, had concerns about the wording in the amendments. There was discussion from Ramsey, 43rd, Balfour, 9th, and Butterworth, 50th. Weber, 40th, offered proposed amendments. Commissioner Thurmond and Balfour, 9th, discussed Child Labor Laws.

Weber, 40th, offered two amendments:

Amendment #1 – Tate, 38th, moved and Ramsey, 43rd, seconded Do Pass. Vote was unanimous. (6-0)

Amendment #2 – Tate, 38th, moved and Ramsey, 43rd, seconded Do Pass. Vote was unanimous. (6-0)

Fort, 39th, moved on HB-493 and was seconded by Balfour, 9th, to Do Pass by Substitute. Vote was unanimous. (6-0)
