**2010 RULES OF THE
SENATE APPROPRIATIONS COMMITTEE**

1. The quorum of the Committee shall be sixteen (16) members.
2. The Chairman shall determine which bills and resolutions are to be considered and the order in which said measures are considered.
3. The Chairman shall have the authority to refer bills and resolutions to Subcommittees for study. Such Subcommittees in turn shall have the authority to make recommendations on such measures to the full Committee.
4. The Committee shall convene, recess, and adjourn upon the order of the Chairman.
5. Any member or members of the Committee who disagree with the majority report of the Committee shall be privileged to file a minority report.
6. These rules may be amended upon a motion duly made and subsequently approved by two-thirds of the members of the Committee.
7. A bill, resolution, or other matter will be considered only after presentation by its principal author or a legislator designated by the author.

The Senate Appropriations Committee met on Tuesday, February 16, 2010 in Room 341 State Capitol, convening at 10:00 a.m. Members present are listed on the attached Roll Call sheet.

The meeting was called to order by Senator Jack Hill, Chairman of the Senate Appropriations Committee. Business was conducted as follows:

S.B. 381 by Goggans of the 7th and others – Planning and Budget Office; require tax expenditure reports/fee reports as part of the budget report; definitions; contents, requirements

This bill requires the Governor's Budget Report to contain a comprehensive report of all fees collected and administered by any budget unit. Details of any such fees must include:

- The statutory authorization for the fee;
- A description of the associated service or product provided;
- The current rate of the fee;
- The fund in which the fee is deposited;
- The previous two years' revenue raised by the fee;
- Any proposal the agency may have to create a new fee, or change a fee;
- The inflationary pressures that have arisen since the fee was last set;
- The effect on budgetary adequacy if the fee is not increased (under a proposed increase);
- The existence of comparable fees in other jurisdictions; and
- Any other considerations relating to the fee.

Additionally, the bill defines a "fee" as any source of revenue classified by the Office of Planning and Budget as a fee, including every fee, business license, non-business license, fine, penalty, surcharge, assessment, add-on, or other type of charge imposed by any budget unit. Finally, "budget unit" is currently defined in Code as a department, institution, agency or other unit of organization for which separate appropriations are made.

Goggans of the 7th, author of the bill, thoroughly reviewed the contents and intent of the legislation and accepted questions from the Committee.

There were no questions. A motion was made by Hooks, of the 14th, that **S.B. 381**, **"Do pass by substitute"**, seconded by Williams of the 19th. The bill passed unanimously.

February 16, 2010

H.B. 947 by Ralston of the 7th and others – Supplemental appropriations; State Fiscal Year July 1, 2009-June 30, 2010

A Bill to amend an Act providing appropriations for the State Fiscal Year beginning July 1, 2009, and ending June 30, 2010, known as the “General Appropriations Act,” approved May 11, 2009, as House Bill 119, Act No. 345 (Ga. L. 2009, Vol. I, Book II).

Hill of the 4th, Chair, presented the Senate version of H.B. 947 by providing an overview of the differences that existed between the House and Senate versions. He discussed the difficult budget decisions and challenges that were faced by the Appropriations Committee during this process due to accumulating shortfalls caused by unprecedented declining revenues. He then noted that all thirteen Subcommittee Chairs were in attendance to assist with defined questions from the Committee. Chairman Hill also thanked the Senate Budget and Evaluation Office staff for their hard work and dedication in helping the subcommittees to develop the FY10 Supplemental Budget.

Following questions, a motion was made by Harp of the 29th that **H.B. 947**, “**Do pass by substitute,**” seconded by Mullis of the 53rd. Unanimous vote.

There being no further business to come before the Committee, the meeting was adjourned at 10:45 a.m.

March 18, 2010

The Senate Appropriations Committee met on Thursday, March 18, 2010 in Room 341 State Capitol, convening at 11:00 a.m. Members present are listed on the attached Roll Call sheet.

The meeting was called to order by Senator Jack Hill, Chairman of the Senate Appropriations Committee. Chairman Hill announced that the Committee would defer any action on S.B. 413, withdrawn by the author, Hill of the 32nd; thereby eliminating it from the agenda currently being considered by the Committee. Business was conducted as follows:

S.B. 480 by Hill of the 4th and others – State Council of Economic Advisors; creation; provide composition, duties, and responsibilities

This bill creates the State Council of Economic Advisors composed of five members. The Governor appoints three members, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives and the President of the Senate appoint one member each.

Each appointed member must be an economist or a person with expertise in state revenues in Georgia. Each member serves for the same term as the person who appointed him or her. Each member receives compensation set by the Governor and paid from funds appropriated to the Governor's office.

The Council is responsible for determining, for the purpose of preparing the Governor's budget recommendation to the General Assembly, the amount of unappropriated surplus expected to have accrued in the state treasury at the beginning of the next fiscal year and the total treasury receipts from existing revenue sources anticipated to be collected in the next fiscal year less anticipated refunds. The determination must be made no later than July 31st for the next fiscal year's budget recommendation, and no later than September 30th for the amended budget. The Council's determinations must be submitted to the Governor, the Speaker, the President of the Senate, and the Chairpersons of the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations.

Finally, the Governor is authorized to reduce the Council's estimates, but is not authorized to increase estimates without concurrence of the Council.

Hill of the 4th, author of the bill, presented it in detail to the members of the Committee. Following a brief discussion, questions and clarification, the Chair entertained a motion by Hooks of the 14th that **S.B. 480**, "**Do pass**", seconded by Mullis of the 53rd. Unanimous vote.

S.B. 414 by Mullis of the 53rd and others – “Jared Little Act”; Georgia State Indemnification Fund; payment shall be made to parents/siblings

Current law provides that in the case of death or organic brain damage suffered in the line of duty by a law enforcement officer, firefighter, emergency medical technician, emergency management specialist, or prison guard, payment from the Georgia State Indemnification Fund must be made to the surviving unremarried spouse, to the dependents of the spouse or deceased person, or to the legal guardian of the brain damaged person.

This legislation provides that such payment may also be made to the deceased person’s parents if the person does not have an un-remarried spouse or dependents, or to his or her surviving siblings if the person has no surviving parents.

Mullis of the 53rd presented the bill and explained its intent, to compensate family members of any first responder emergency personnel who suffered permanent brain damage or was killed in the line of duty regardless of the victim’s marital status. The author further explained that this single status should be a qualifying factor in the indemnification fund after giving their lives in the line of duty as well as fulfilling their obligations to the state of Georgia.

A motion was made by Seabaugh of the 28th to amend the underlying bill to correct a misspelled name, striking the word Jared and inserting the word Jarrett, seconded by Wiles of the 37th. Following a lengthy discussion, many questions and specific clarification from Legislative Counsel, a motion was made by Thompson of the 33rd that **S.B. 414, “Do pass by substitute”**, seconded by Douglas of the 17th. Unanimous vote.

S.B. 421 by Hill of the 4th and others – Budget/Financial Affairs; Revenue Shortfall Reserve; not exceed 15 percent of previous year’s net revenue for any fiscal year

This bill relates to the management of budgetary and financial affairs, so as to provide that the Revenue Shortfall Reserve shall not exceed 15 percent of the previous year’s net revenue for any given fiscal year. Current law sets the cap at 10 percent.

Chairman Hill, the author, presented the bill to the Committee. There were no questions. A motion was offered by Hooks of the 14th that **S.B. 421, “Do pass”**, seconded by Seabaugh of the 28th. Unanimous vote.

S.B. 385 by Wiles of the 37th and others – Detention; counties demonstrate use of federal Dept. of Homeland Security's Secure Communities initiative; funding for housing state inmates

Increased Inmate Reimbursement Rates for Counties in Partnership with the Federal Department of Homeland Security - This bill is relating to conditions of detention generally, so as to provide that counties that can demonstrate constant use of the Federal Department of Homeland Security's Secure Communities initiative or have entered into memorandums of agreement with the federal government under Section 287(g) of the federal Immigration and Nationality Act shall receive additional funding for housing state inmates.

Wiles of the 37th, the primary author, explained that this bill provides incentives to counties that qualify for enrollment in the U.S. Federal Government section 287(g) and/or the Secure Communities Act. Sen. Wiles brought forth a substitute to the bill that was based on the Fiscal Note findings detailing the monetary impact of the legislation, which estimated that if all counties eventually qualified for the increased rate, the fiscal impact to the state could total \$5 million annually. The substitute prohibited the subsidy from taking effect until the funding was appropriated based on the establishment of future revenues.

The Senate Appropriations Committee then heard testimony on behalf of this legislation.

Chairman Hill recognized Grant of the 25th to present the Subcommittee report on S.B. 385 to the full committee.

The Subcommittee members previously appointed to study S.B. 385 were:
Senator Johnny Grant of the 25th, Chair
Senator George Hooks of the 14th
Senator Bill Heath of the 31st.

Chairman Grant reviewed the details of the public hearing which was held on March 9, 2010 in which members of the Subcommittee heard testimony from local sheriffs as well as the Department of Corrections on the positive impacts of the implementation of this legislation.

In the final report and recommendation to the full Appropriations Committee, the Subcommittee recognized that the beneficiaries of the implementation of this program were primarily the metro counties due to their large population of illegal immigrants; therefore, the Subcommittee felt these counties stood to implement and endorse this program more successfully. Grant of the 25th noted that all members appointed to the Subcommittee to study S.B. 385 were from rural areas; therefore, the subcommittee unanimously felt the bill should be dealt with by the Full Committee. Based on this interpretation of the bill, the Subcommittee decided to defer from a recommendation and ask that it be at the will of the Full Committee.

Page Four
March 18, 2010

Following a lengthy discussion, questions and explanations, a motion was made by Unterman of the 45th that [S.B. 385](#), “**Do pass by substitute**”, seconded by Thomas of the 54th. The bill passed with 13 votes in favor and 8 opposed (Hooks of the 14th, Grant of the 25th, Tolleson of the 20th, Cowsert of the 46th, Bulloch of the 11th, Fort of the 39th, Heath of the 31st and Tate of the 38th.)

[S.B. 500 by Wiles of the 37th](#) - Auctioneers; provide a maximum amount for the auctioneers education, research and recovery fund

This bill provides that effective July 1, 2010, instead of the Georgia Auctioneers Commission maintaining a minimum balance of \$100,000 in the auctioneers education, research and recovery fund, \$100,000 will be the maximum amount allowed to be maintained. Additionally, any funds in excess of \$100,000 must be transferred to the general fund of the state treasury.

Language allowing the Commission to spend funds in excess of \$100,000 for underwriting the cost of education and research programs to benefit licensees is deleted.

Wiles of the 37th, author, presented the bill to the Committee. The Auctioneers’ Trust Fund was legislation created to offer recovery options to individuals aggrieved by an act of an auctioneer with a maximum of \$10,000 per claim. A provision in the law also allows the fund to be used for the education of auctioneers. Currently there is over \$500,000 in the fund with only one claim being paid out in the last eight years. S.B. 500 caps the fund at \$100,000 and removes the provision of the educational use of funds and it allows the balance of the money to go into the state’s general fund.

The Senate Appropriations Committee then heard testimony on behalf of the Georgia Auctioneers Association in opposition to this legislation.

Sen. Wiles offered closing remarks. Following a lengthy debate, many questions and clarifications, Heath of the 31st, offered a motion that [S.B. 500](#) “**Do not pass**”, seconded by Grant of the 25th. A substitute motion was then offered by Thompson of the 33rd, seconded by Wiles of the 37th that [S.B. 500](#) “**Do pass**”.

The Chair then called for a vote of all in favor of passing out SB 500 with a “do pass” recommendation. The motion failed with a vote of 6 votes in favor and 13 opposed.

Page Five
March 18, 2010

S.B. 512 by Hill of the 4th – Sales/Use Taxes; provide state revenue commissioner with authority to collect sales/use taxes from businesses that may not be obligated

This bill authorizes the State Revenue Commissioner to provide for the collection of uncollected sales and use taxes that businesses may otherwise not be obligated to collect and remit. Additionally, it authorizes the commissioner to employ contractors for such collection, and such contractors will be compensated only on a commission or contingent fee basis. Finally, the bill delineates that no employee of the department may be approved as a contractor under this newly-created Code section.

Hill of the 4th explained that this bill identifies businesses which are not obligated to pay taxes, primarily e-retailers located in other states. He further explained that courts have ruled that the state can only force retailers who have a physical presence within the state to collect and remit sales taxes. Chairman Hill defined this bill as permissive legislation authorizing the Commissioner of the Department of Revenue, at his discretion, to deal individually or collectively in negotiations with e-retailer vendors to offer tax options for collections fees for aforementioned businesses that are not obligated to collect taxes.

After a brief discussion and questions, a motion was made by Unterman of the 45th that **S.B. 512, “Do pass”**, seconded by Murphy of the 27th. Unanimous vote.

There being no further business to come before the Committee, the meeting was adjourned at 12:35 p.m.

April 20, 2010

The Senate Appropriations Committee met on Tuesday, April 20, 2010 in Room 341 State Capitol, convening at 10:00 a.m. Members present are listed on the attached Roll Call sheet.

The meeting was called to order by Senator Jack Hill, Chairman of the Senate Appropriations Committee. Business was conducted as follows:

H. B. 44 by Graves of the 12th and others – Budget Act; application of zero-based budgeting; provisions

This bill requires that beginning with the January 2010 Governor's budget report, zero-based budgeting will be used for no more than one-third nor less than one-quarter of all programs in the most recently passed General Appropriations Act. The Office of Planning and Budget (OPB) will determine which programs will be submitted using zero-based budgeting. No program will be required to use zero-based budgeting more often than once every three years; however, each program must use it at least once every four years.

Additionally, the Board of Regents of the University System is a budget unit that will be periodically subject to zero-based budgeting. Finally, the Department of Education's budget must be submitted as a zero-based budget in January 2010.

Representative Loudermilk of the 14th, co-author of the bill, presented and explained it to the Senate Appropriations Committee. He then offered an amendment that named the bill the Shafer-Graves Zero-Based Budget Act.

A discussion and questions ensued followed with an objection by Mullis of the 53rd to amend the title of the bill by renaming it after the two legislators.

Chairman Hill requested that the motion for passage of H.B. 44 be taken by two votes; the first vote by show of hands on the amendment to the renaming of the Act as the Shafer-Graves Act. The amendment failed.

A second amendment to the bill changing a date from 2010 to 2011 due to the fact that the bill was a hold-over bill from last session. The date change would occur on line 43. This amendment was passed unanimously.

Page Two
April 20, 2010

A motion was made by Bulloch of the 11th, seconded by Pearson of the 51st that [H.B. 44](#), **“Do pass as Amended”**. The Bill passed with a unanimous vote.

Chairman Hill then noted that at the request of the author, Rep. Collins of the 27th, that [H.B. 1431](#) be removed from the Senate Appropriations Committee agenda.

[H.B. 948](#) **by Ralston of the 7th and others** – General Appropriations; State Fiscal Year July 1, 2010 - June 30, 2011

A Bill to make and provide appropriations for the State Fiscal Year beginning July 1, 2010 and ending June 30, 2011.

Chairman Hill presented the Senate version of H.B. 948 and explained the necessity of the budget cuts by agencies of 8% Budget Highlights

He highlighted various differences and budget cuts by department in the Senate Committee Substitute and noted that there were minimal highlights in this budget. After a brief discussion, the Chair accepted questions of the Committee members and noted that all Subcommittee Chairs as well as Senate Budget staff were in attendance to assist with inquiries.

There were no questions. A motion was made by Hooks of the 14th that [H.B. 948](#), **“Do pass by Substitute”**, seconded by Thomas of the 54th. Unanimous vote.
