SENATE JUDICIARY COMMITTEE RULES

2010

1. Quorum of the Committee shall be six (6) members.
2. The Chairman shall determine which bills, resolutions, substitutes, or amendments are to be considered and the order in which said measures are considered; the Chairman shall have the authority and discretion to call a bill, resolution, substitute or amendment for debate and explanation only or to limit consideration of such measures.
3. The Chairman shall have the authority to refer bills and resolutions to subcommittee for study. Such subcommittees in turn shall have the authority to make recommendation on such measures to the full Committee at such times as shall be designated by the Chairman.
4. The Chairman shall have the authority to schedule, manage, and regulate the debate on bills, resolutions, substitutes, and amendments, and may in his discretion recognize motions related to such measures and the order in which they are recognized.
5. The Committee shall convene, recess and adjourn upon the order of the Chairman.
6. A bill or resolution will be considered only after presentation by its principal author or other legislator whom he/she may designate unless otherwise directed by the Chairman. The principal author shall be the legislator whose name appears first on the list of authors.
7. The Chairman reserves the right to delay or decline action on substitutes and amendments not provided by the Chairman in writing at least 24 hours prior to the hearing in which they are presented.
8. Any Member or Members of the Committee who disagree with the majority report of the Committee shall be privileged to file a minority report if they so desire.
9. These rules may be amended upon a motion duly made and subsequently approved by two-thirds of the members of the Committee.
10. Where these rules are silent on a specific issue, the Rules of the Senate as adopted shall govern.

The Senate Judiciary Committee held a meeting on April 15, 2010 at 2:00 p.m. in Room 450 Capitol.

Acting Chairman Harp called the meeting to order at 2:00 p.m.

HB 323 (Rep. Ralston, 7th) Death Penalty Cases; Supreme Court; pretrial proceedings; extend review period

Bill Reilly, General Counsel for the Speaker of the House of Representatives, presented HB 323 on behalf of the Speaker. He stated that this bill extends the period of time for the Supreme Court to either deny or grant review of pretrial proceedings in death penalty cases from 20 to 45 days. Also, makes changes to appellate review of death penalty cases.

Opposition was expressed by Sandra Michaels, GACDL, stating that criminal defense attorneys expressed deep concern that the changes made in the substitute make huge changes to the death penalty review method (known as "proportionality review" to prevent arbitrariness) in Georgia, which will almost certainly result in litigation and will likely be overturned for unconstitutionality.

Senator Wiles made a motion that [HB 323](#), "do pass by substitute." Senator Crosby seconded the motion. HB 323 passed by unanimous vote. Senator Wiles will carry HB 323 on the Senate floor.

[HB 329](#) (Rep. Golick, 34th) Probated or Suspended Sentences; Maximum Period of Revocation; change provisions

Representative Golick presented HB 329 to the committee. He stated that the Silver Comet Trail murder case was his purpose for submitting this legislation and that Mr. Ledford was released on parole when he committed this crime. If this legislation were in place, such would have been impossible. The legislation states that for the purpose of revoking probation, a felony offense is defined as a misdemeanor offense committed in another state that would constitute a felony in Georgia, or a misdemeanor offense committed in another state admitted to by the defendant, who also admits that the offense would have been a felony had it been committed in Georgia.

Senator Wiles made a motion that [HB 329](#), "do pass by substitute". Senator Seabaugh seconded the motion. HB 329 passed by unanimous vote. Senator Wiles will carry HB 329 on the Senate floor.

Note: Senator Smith came into the meeting.

[HB 571](#) (Rep. Ralson, 7th) Sexual Offenders; classification; change and enact provisions

Representative Golick presented HB 571 to the committee stating the sexual offenders list should have some structural changes due to court rulings.

Note: Senator Judson Hill came into the meeting.

After extensive discussion, Acting Chairman Harp stated that [HB 571](#) would be tabled and voted on at the next meeting, to be held on Monday, April 19, 2010.

[HB 199](#) (Rep. Jerguson, 22nd) Warrants for arrest; persons who may issue warrants; provisions

Representative Jerguson presented HB 199 to the committee. He stated that the purpose of the bill was to address frivolous warrant applications by non-law enforcement by requiring such applications be heard in a warrant application court hearing.

Note: Senator Seabaugh left the meeting.

Senator Wiles made a motion that [HB 199](#), “do pass”. Senator Judson Hill seconded the motion. HB 199 passed by unanimous vote. Senator Crosby will carry HB 199 on the Senate floor.

[HB 1140](#) (Rep. Lane, 167th) Alcovy, Atlanta, and Brunswick judicial circuits; dates of terms; change

Representative Willard spoke on behalf of HB 1140. He stated that in 2008, HB 1163 was enacted, providing one additional superior court judge for each of the Alcovy, Atlanta and Brunswick circuits. That bill specified the initial term for those new judges as July 1, 2009 through December 31, 2010; this bill changes the term to begin on July 1, 2010 and end on December 31, 2012. Under HB 1163, these judges would have participated in the 2010 general election. Under this bill, these three judgeships will be up for election in 2012 to give them time to serve in their new positions and give voters a chance to get to know them.

Senator Hamrick made a motion that [HB 1140](#), “do pass”. Senator Crosby seconded the motion. HB 1140 passed by unanimous vote. Senator Wiles will carry HB 1140 on the Senate floor.

[HB 1104](#) (Rep. Pruett, 144th) Probation Options Management for Juveniles

Representative Pruett presented HB 1104 to the committee and stated that there would be a substitute that would incorporate SB 423 into the legislation.

Acting Chairman Harp moved any action on the bill until the next meeting to give legislative counsel and the authors an opportunity to produce a comprehensive substitute.

Note: Senator Chance came into the meeting.

Note: Senator Smith left the meeting.

[HB 889](#) (Rep. Walker, 107th) Recognizance bonds; persons charged with certain crimes; limit

Representative Walker presented HB 889 to the committee. He stated that Atlanta/Fulton County led the nation in failure to appear and that bail forfeitures have been in the millions. This legislation would limit the scope which would put protections in place. Rep. Walker stated that he believed this was a matter of public safety.

Senator Hamrick stated that he would prefer that the bill be amended.

After a great deal of discussion, Acting Chairman Harp stated that parties should get together and work out amended language. He postponed action until the following meeting.

Note: Senator Judson Hill left the meeting.

[HB 1165](#) (Rep. Chambers, 81st) Sunset revisions; repeal automatic expiration; provisions

Representative Chamber presented HB 1165 stating that this bill simply repeals the sunset date for the Georgia State Patrol Motorcycle Unit because the program is very successful.

Senator Chance made a motion that [HB 1165](#), "do pass". Senator Unterman seconded the motion. HB 1165 passed by unanimous vote. Senator John Douglas will carry HB 1165 on the Senate floor.

[HB 917](#) (Rep. Jacobs, 80th) Uniform Interstate Depositions and Discovery Act; enact

Representative Jacobs presented HB 917 stating that this bill repeals the "Uniform Foreign Depositions Act" and replaces it with the "Uniform Interstate Depositions and Discovery Act" to make the process for foreign depositions more cost efficient and streamlined.

Senator Crosby made a motion that [HB 917](#), "do pass". Senator Unterman seconded the motion. HB 917 passed by unanimous vote. Senator Hamrick will carry HB 917 on the Senate floor.

[HB 901](#) (Rep. Levitas, 82nd) Repeat offenders; fourth felony offense punishment; change provisions

Representative Levitas spoke to HB 901 explaining that current law states that any person convicted in Georgia of a fourth or subsequent felony after having been convicted here or in any other state of three previous felonies must serve the maximum time as sentenced by the judge and will not be eligible for parole, except for a capital felony. This bill eliminated the exception for capital felonies, so that any fourth or subsequent felony conviction must result in the maximum sentence.

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Senator Crosby made a motion that [HB 901](#), “do pass”. Senator Cowser seconded the motion. HB 901 passed by unanimous vote. Senator Cowser will carry HB 901 on the Senate floor.

**[HB 1387](#) (Rep. Willard, 49th) Official Code of Georgia Annotated;
correct errors and omissions**

Representative Willard spoke to HB 1387 stating that this was an annual house keeping bill that corrected typographical errors, spelling errors and punctuation errors.

Senator Seabaugh made a motion that [HB 1387](#), “do pass”. Senator Unterman seconded the motion. HB 1387 passed by unanimous vote. Senator Seabaugh will carry HB 1387 on the Senate floor.

Acting Chairman Harp called the meeting to order at 2:18 p.m.

HB 571 (Rep. Ralston, 7th)

Sexual Offenders; classification; change and enact provisions

Representative Golick presented **HB 571** for Speaker Ralston. He stated that this legislation makes several changes to the Sexual Offender registration laws due to the courts declaring portions of the law unenforceable.

A great deal of discussion was about the rumor that this bill included Senator Unterman's child prostitution bill. Representative Golick assured the committee that Senator Unterman's bill was not included in this legislation.

Mary Beth Westmoreland, Georgia Attorney General's Office, Gary Moss, District Attorney's Association, Oliver Hunter, Sheriff's Association, Sara Totonchi, Southern Center for Human Rights, all spoke in support of the bill.

Senator Unterman made a motion that **HB 571**, "**do pass by substitute**". Senator Ramsey seconded the motion. **HB 571** passed by unanimous vote. Chairman Harp will carry HB 571 on the Senate floor.

**[HR 136](#) (Rep. Bryant, 160th) Owners of Real Property; Industrial Areas;
Remove Property**

Representative Bryant presented **HR 136** to the committee explaining as currently written, any person owning property in an industrial area may voluntarily remove the property by filing a certificate with the local clerk of superior court, but only if the property is located on an island. This amendment to the Constitution would strike the requirement that the property be located on an island. This legislation was requested by Garden City which is adjacent to Savannah.

Senator Ramsey made a motion that **[HR 136](#)**, “do pass by substitute”. Senator Hamrick seconded the motion. **HR 136** passed by unanimous vote. Senator Lester Jackson will carry HR 136 on the Senate floor.

Note: Senator Wiles left the meeting.

**[HB 303](#) (Rep. Rogers, 26th) Child Abuse Reports; access to records;
Solicitors-general; authorize**

Representative Rogers presented **HB 303** to the committee stating that this bill simply allows state court solicitors access to child abuse records and reports. He stated that this would further protect children who have been abused.

Stephanie Woodard, Hall County Solicitor, spoke in favor of the legislation.

Senator Crosby made a motion that **[HB 303](#)**, “do pass”. Senator Ramsey seconded the motion. **HB 303** passed by unanimous vote. Senator Crosby will carry HB 303 on the Senate floor.

Note: Senator Cowser came into the meeting.

[HB 1104](#) (Pruett, 144th) Probation Options Management for Juveniles

Representative Pruettt presented **HB 1104** to the committee stating that under this legislation courts may require juveniles to participate in a probation management program as a condition of probation. Such programs will include graduated sanctions. The bill also incorporates SB 423, the Smash & Grab Act.

Senator Cowser made a motion that **[HB 1104](#)**, “do pass by substitute”. Senator Chance seconded the motion. **HB 1104** passed by unanimous vote. Senator Cowser will carry HB 1104 on the Senate floor.

HB 956 (Rep. Powell, 171st) Dismissal of appeals; may be dismissed if improperly filed; provide

Senator Crosby presented **HB 956** in the absence of Representative Powell. He stated that this legislation was greatly needed to correct legislation. He stated that it would provide that an appeal may be dismissed if filed as a direct appeal under Code Section 5-6-34 when it should have been filed as an application for an appeal under Code Section 5-6-35.

Senator Ramsey made a motion that **HB 956**, “do pass”. Senator Hamrick seconded the motion. **HB 956** passed by unanimous vote. Senator Crosby will carry HB 956 on the Senate floor.

Note: Senator Wiles returned to the meeting.

HB 889 (Rep. Walker, 107th) Recognizance bonds; persons charged with certain crimes; limit

Representative Walker presented **HB 889** to the committee stating that too many violent felons are let out on bail, and then fail to appear for their court date. This bill prohibits bail for certain serious offenses. However, the bill provides for an exception if an elected state or superior court judge enters a written order with specific reasons allowing release on bail in order to enter a pretrial release, intervention or diversion program.

Judy Kramer, Fulton County Superior Court, spoke in opposition stating that she did not want their successful pre-trial diversion programs jeopardized. The requirement that only elected judges may make an exception means that magistrate court judges will be unable to participate in sending offenders to pre-trial programs.

Note: Senator Seabaugh and Senator Fort came into the meeting.

Senator Ramsey stated that he had concerns because it put too much on judges and would clog and back log the system.

Senator Fort asked if Fulton County had oversight in the courts and Senator Hamrick asked if the legislation only applies to certain offenses. Ms. Kramer stated that 25% of the cases would be affected.

Senator Wiles made a motion that **HB 889**, “do pass by substitute”. Senator Hamrick seconded the motion. **HB 889** passed by a vote of 6-4 with Senators Cowsert, Ramsey, Brown and Seabaugh voting no. Senator Hamrick will carry HB 889 on the Senate floor.

Note: Senator Smith came into the meeting.

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HB 24 (Rep. Willard, 49th) Evidence; revise, supersede, and modernize provisions; provide definitions

Representative Willard presented **HB 24** to the committee stating that this is the evidence re-write legislation. He stated that Georgia would be the 44th state to enact the model rules. He stated that it would adopt the model Federal Rules of Evidence (FRE), as 44 other states have done. FRE has been in use in federal court for 35 years, so most Georgia lawyers already use them. The Georgia evidence code has never had a substantial revision, so the rules are outdated. Senators Wiles and Cowsert expressed concern that this 130 page bill changes more than just the purported evidence code and that the bill needs more study in the Senate; the House had 1.5 years before passing it. Senator Harp countered that the FRE are a huge improvement over the Georgia laws, which are confusing.

Note: Senator Smith left the meeting.

Senator Crosby and Senator Ramsey stated that they too had concerns but thought that the legislation should move forward.

Senator Wiles made a motion that **HB 24 “be tabled”**. Senator Cowsert seconded the motion. The motion failed by a vote of 4-6.

Senator Ramsey made a motion that **HB 24, “do pass”**. Senator Brown seconded the motion. **HB 24** passed by a vote of 6-5. Opposing the motion were Senators Wiles, Cowsert, Seabaugh, Judson Hill and Chance. Senator Harp will carry HB 24 on the Senate floor.
