RULES

Senate Interstate Cooperation Committee

2014 Legislative Session

Introduction:

Each member of the Committee should be mindful of the Senate Rules especially regarding attendance.

- 1. A quorum of the Committee shall be 3 members.
- 2. The Chairman shall determine which bills and resolutions are to be considered and the order in which said measures are considered.
- 3. The Chairman shall have the authority to refer bills and resolutions to subcommittees for study. Such subcommittees in turn shall have the authority to make recommendations on such measures to the full Committee at such time as shall be designated by the Chairman.
- 4. The Committee shall reconvene, recess, and adjourn upon the order of the Chairman.
- 5. A bill or resolution will be considered only after presentation by its principal author or other legislator whose name appears first or second on the list of authors or cosponsors, unless the author or cosponsor has made other arrangements with the Chairman.
- 6. No member of the Committee shall be allowed to vote by proxy.
- 7. Members may not abstain from voting unless the member or any member of the Senator's immediate family has a direct pecuniary interest in the result of such vote which interest is distinct, unique or peculiar to the Senator or the Senator's immediate family.
- 8. Any member or members of the Committee who disagree with the majority report of the Committee shall be privileged to file a minority report if they so desire.
- 9. These rules may be amended upon a motion duly made and subsequently approved by two-thirds of the members of the Committee.
- 10. Where these rules are silent on a specific issue, the Rules of the Senate as adopted shall govern.

Minutes Senate Interstate Cooperation Committee Wednesday, March 5, 2014 125 State Capitol

Chairman Davis called the meeting to order at 2:07 p.m. The following members were in attendance:

Senator Hardie Davis, 22nd, Chairman Senator Freddie Powell Sims, 12th, Vice-Chairman Senator Emanuel Jones, 10th, Secretary

This was the first meeting of the Senate Interstate Cooperation Committee of the 2014 Legislative Session. Chairman Davis introduced himself and welcomed committee members, staff, and guests. Chairman Davis asked Jones of the 10th to open the meeting with a prayer.

The meeting began with discussion and adoption of the committee rules for the 2014 Legislative Session. Motion "do pass" was made by Jones of the 10th, seconded by Sims of the 12th. **The motion passed unanimously.**

HB 898 (Pak, 108th- Interstate Compact for Juveniles; enact

This bill was presented by Rep. Pak of the 108th. Pak of the 108th explained that currently Georgia is the last state to pass the revised pact between the states, and this means that the state of Georgia is currently missing out on important information regarding juvenile delinquents from other states. If a juvenile delinquent moves from another state to Georgia the state of Georgia does not receive their background history. The only way to find out if they have a previous criminal track history is if they are arrested within the state of Georgia. The state of Georgia is also currently unable to send juveniles back to their former states unless the state wishes to spare out of pocket expenses to send the juvenile back to their former state. Pak of the 108th discussed specifically Section 5 of HB 898, which was discussed by the Interstate Cooperation Committee last year. Section 5 Part B of HB 898 discusses staff appointments and states how official positions are assigned for the Commissioner and the Deputy Commissioner.

Sims of the 12th asked Pak why there was a \$28,000.00 fee. Pak of the 108th explained that this fee would help fund the program, pay for hiring, staff, and any other necessary expenses. Sims of the 12th asked if funding was solely provided by each state or territory and Pak of the 108th answered that it was mainly funded nationally. Sims of the 12th asked where headquarters were located but Pak of the 108th did not know.

Chairman Davis introduced the members of the audience who were interested in this type of legislation. John Smith, of the Juvenile Court of Justice, and Polly McKinny, Advocacy Director for Voices for Georgia's Children, greeted the committee.

John Smith answered Sims of the 12th's previous question about where the headquarters location was and John Smith stated that headquarters were located in Kentucky.

Chairman Davis at this time noted that Georgia's Commission had not been discussed. John Smith explained that the amount of \$28,000 is based on population, Georgia's population is comparable to Ohio's population and therefore the estimate was based on what Ohio pays. Pak of the 108th noted that how the state council is formed is articulated in Article 9, and explains that the state council would need a representative from the legislative, judicial, and executive branches of government.

Chairman Davis asked the committee members and audience for any further questions. Jones of 10th asked if the Governor will have to sign the legislation if it passes in the Senate. Pak of the 108th explained that this bill will make Georgia members of the Juvenile Pact and that it does not need the Governor's signature to become law and further explains that it only needs to pass in the Senate to become law as it has already passed in the House. Jones of the 10th addressed the budget again and wanted to know if funds are coming from the State or from a specific department. Pak of the 108th responded that funds will be coming from the Juvenile Justice Department. John Smith further explained that the Juvenile Justice Department already handles Juvenile cases but it makes tracking juveniles that come to our state easier and it will also streamline costs. John Smith explained that currently if a Juvenile delinquent comes to the state of Georgia and then needs to be sent back to their home state, there are no funds set aside for those costs and in the end it makes the process more expensive and difficult and if Georgia were part of the Juvenile Pact it would streamline this whole process and there would be funds specifically for the purpose of transporting juveniles back to the proper location. Jones of the 10th asked where these funds will come from and John Smith explained that that will be included in current operating costs.

Chairman Davis entertained a motion adding that he believes this to be good legislation. A "do pass" motion was made by Jones of the 10th, seconded by Sims of the 12th. **The motion passed unanimously (LC 29 5840ER/a).**
