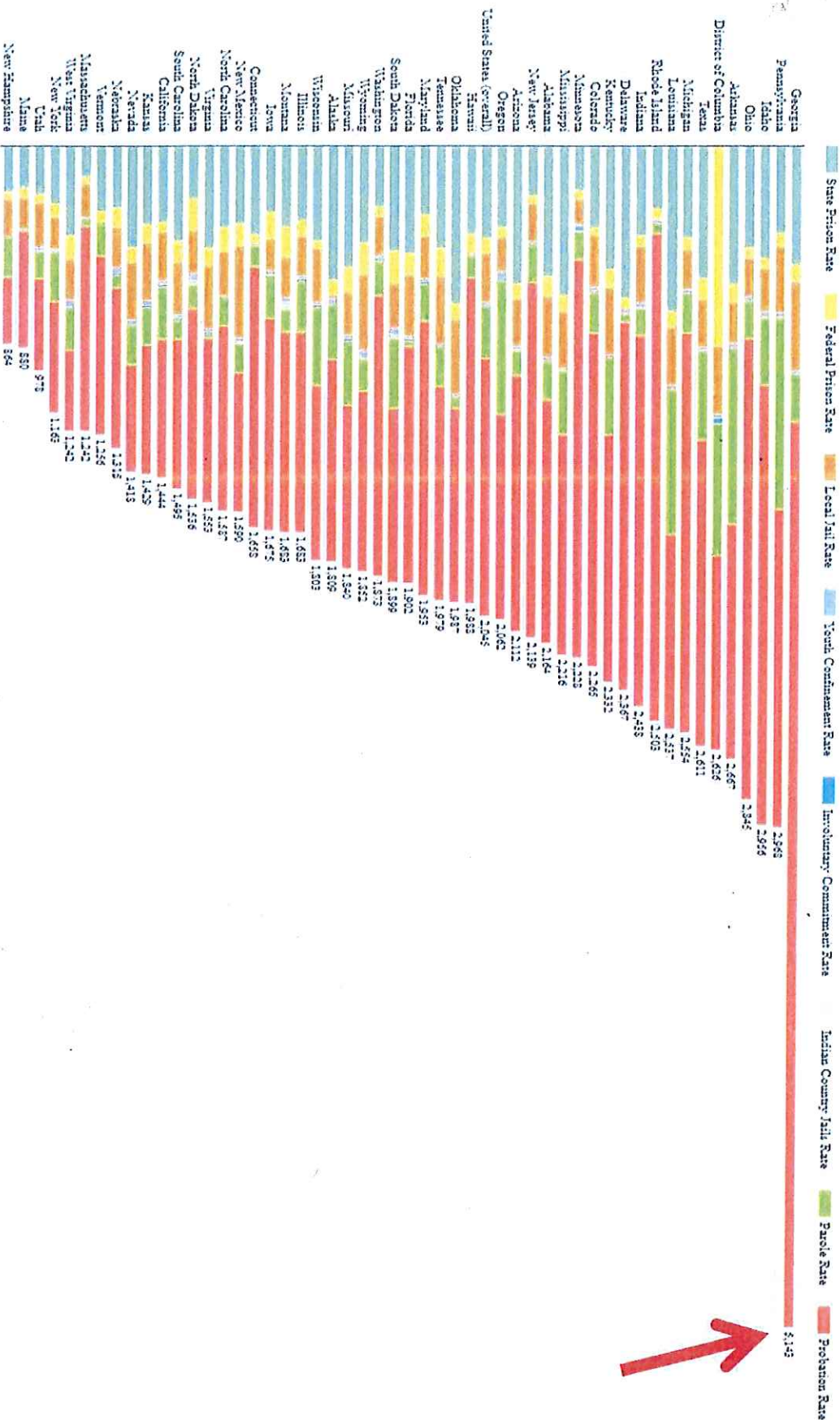


Voting Rights for Formerly Incarcerated People

- All people with felony convictions are permanently disenfranchised
- Some people with felony convictions cannot vote.
- People in prison, on parole and on probation cannot vote. People with felony convictions can vote upon completion of sentence.
- People in prison cannot vote. Everyone else can vote.
- People in prison and on parole cannot vote. All other people with criminal convictions, including people on probation, can vote.
- Everyone has the right to vote.

# Rates of Correctional Control



\*Correctional control\* includes federal prisons, state prisons, local jails, youth confinement, Indian Country jails, involuntary commitment, parole and probation. Rates are per 100,000 total population in that state, D.C., or, for all 50 states and D.C. combined.
