



SMALL BOX DISCOUNT STORE DEFINITION


For the purposes of legislation in DeKalb, a "small box discount store" means a retail store that is 16,000 square feet or less in size, which offers for sale a variety of convenience shopping goods and continuously offers the majority of the items in their inventory for sale at a price lower than traditional retail stores. Small box discount store does not include stores that contain a pharmacy, sell gasoline or diesel fuel, or primarily sell specialty food items, i.e. meats, seafood, cheese, or oils and vinegars.




MARKET TRENDS FOR DOLLAR STORES

- Concentrated Locations. The business model for many dollar store chains involves over-saturating an area with outlets. (ILSR) Many stores are located in close proximity.
- Household Income. Dollar General executive Vice President Jim Thorpe stated characteristics of loyal shoppers included those who live "paycheck to paycheck," or have fixed incomes such as seniors. The presentation also predicted the growing customer demographic of typically white shoppers with household income lower than \$40,000 would "shortly expand to include large numbers of African Americans and millennials". (MSN.com) Dollar Tree's business model targets "medium-to-low-income" neighborhoods.
- <u>Poverty</u>. Because of the above characteristics, this means that many dollar store chains are often found in impoverished neighborhoods.


MARKET TRENDS FOR DOLLAR STORES CONTINUED

- <u>Building Size</u>. Most stores have a square footage of 9,000-10,000 SF, and onestory height.
- Population. DeKalb stores are concentrated in communities where the African American population is above 50%.
- Products. Although many dollar stores
 have expanded their products to include
 healthier options and more food choices,
 it is debatable whether or not the
 distribution of the expansions are
 uniform and some argue that there is
 still not enough healthy food or produce.

- The distribution of Dollar Stores within the County is not uniform.
- The number of Dollar Stores in Unincorporated Super District 7 amounts to 67% of the Dollar Stores in the entire unincorporated region of the County.
- This is more than double that of Super District 6's percentage.
- Over half of the total Dollar Stores in the unincorporated County are accounted for in Super District 7.

The data above is from Feeding America's annual Map the Meal Gap data. Food insecurity is calculated based on six indicators: unemployment, poverty, median income, home ownership, disability, and race/ethnicity. The data for these indicators comes from the Census Bureau's American Community Survey. The latest data available is from two year prior to the release of Map the Meal Gap. This year, in an attempt to measure the impacts that COVID-19 has had on food insecurity, Feeding America has calculated projections. These projections are indicated above with "(2020 projection)". All other fields are based on data from 2018.


Hunger Profile for DeKalb County, GA



Food Insecurity

Food insecurity refers to the lack of access to enough food for an active, healthy life for all household members and limited or uncertain availability of nutritionally adequate foods. Food insecurity is calculated by Feeding America using the following indicators: poverty, unemployment, median household income, home ownership, disability, and race.


Food Insecurity Rates




Food Assistance in DeKalb County

Benefits programs provide assistance for people experiencing food insecurity. SNAP is available to households that are below 130% of the poverty line. Free & Reduced School Meals and WIC are available for children living in households that are below 185% of the poverty line. Poverty is determined by the number of members in a household and their annual income.

Food Insecurity in DeKalb County, GA




Food Bank Partner Agencies*

IMPACT

- Population Because of the demographics in Super District 7, the impacts of Small Box Store chains have a disproportionate impact on African American communities.
- Mobility Some residents may shop and Small Box Stores because of limited mobility as 1.80% of households in target area have no vehicles.
- Market Super District 7's demographic profile appears to closely match the market criteria expressed by Small Box Store chains.
 - A. Medium-to-low-income
 - B. A somewhat high poverty rate
 - C. Potential market for people who may be on a fixed income (higher senior population)
- Data Use demographics at the census tract level along with other known data on food and health to make a better determination of comprehensive impact.
- Property Values Current data shows a direct impact between property values and dollar stores, Lower property values associated with areas with greater presence of small box stores.

POTENTIAL SOLUTIONS

- Strengthen Planning Review Policies: The County can designate certain uses as conditional ones. This means the stores must undergo a review process to meet certain conditions before they open. These conditions can include economic impact and health criteria. (ILSR)
- Expand Financing for Locally Owned Grocery Stores: One of the biggest barriers for entrepreneurs starting new local grocers is securing a business loan. This can be mitigated by supporting local grocery stores in needy areas through financing programs. Funding for these programs could come from eliminating tax incentives for chain stores. (ILSR)
- <u>Speaking Out</u>: Developing local organizations to raise awareness about the negative impacts of Dollar Stores in a given community. (ILSR)
- <u>Education</u>: Early exposure to the importance of healthy eating and lifestyles.
- <u>Community Gardens</u>: Increase local emphasis and funding on community garden development and local farmer markets.
