Senator John Albers, a Republican, represents the 56th District, which includes portions of Fulton and Cherokee County. He serves as chairman of the Senate Public Safety Committee. Senator Albers will also serve as vice-chairman of the Senate Finance and the Regulated Industries and Utilities Committees, as a member of the Senate Appropriations Committee and as an ex-officio of the Rules, State and Local Governmental Operations and Veterans, Military and Homeland Security committees.

Senator Albers has long been an active member of his community.
